### “Evaluating inputs for organic farming – a new system”

Dear stakeholder

I am writing to invite you to a free public conference on 'evaluating inputs for organic farming – a new system'. We are holding this on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> October 2005 at the Commission's Guimard, Rue de Guimard 10, room 0/1.

The conference is the culmination of an EU-funded Concerted Action project in which partners from all over Europe have been working over the last three years. We have:

- compiled information from many EU countries on the varying useages and legislative frameworks for fertilisers and soil conditioners and for plant protection products;
- identified the similarities and differences with a view to establishing a more harmonised approach;
- reviewed Article 7 of Regulation no (EEC) 2092/91 and made proposals for updating and amending it; and
- proposed clear procedures and criteria to assist the Commission in evaluating and approving these inputs.

In the conference, we will be presenting our conclusions of all this work and seeking feedback from you, as interested stakeholders. You will therefore be feeding into the last stage of the project, as we draw up our final recommendations to the Commission.

This topic goes right to the heart of organic farming. What we do and do not allow as inputs to organic farming are critical to its continuing integrity and success. It is vital that we strike the right balance between consumer trust and expectation on the one hand, and what is practical and necessary on the other. We need to honour organic principles but not hold back genuine progress. In this project, we have tried to recognise this heavy responsibility. We ask for your help to review, improve and refine our recommendations.

We look forward to welcoming you at the conference.
